vested in information, I find it very important for me to be knowledgeable and to understand what is around me among those I serve as well. Through statistics I develop a ministry to meet those challenges addressed by them.

The other day I came across a very good article on Christians. The International Bulletin of Missionary Research, Vol. 32, wrote, "The Global Mission divides Christians by "bloc." (More accurately, Christians through the centuries have divided themselves.) "Roman Catholics" claim 1,130,401,000 and their church is really the "big kid on the block." The 422,659,000 "Independents" outnumber 386,644,000 "Protestants" and 252,891,000 "Orthodox" and the rest. As for where they are, 423,675,000 are in Africa; 355,008,000 are in Asia; 556,359,000 are in Europe; 530,187,000 are in Latin America; and, tagging along, 220,374,000 are in Northern America. The compilers know of 39,000 separate denominations and 3,684,000 congregations around the world. Church members around the globe have an income of \$18,170 billion. The nominal Christian percentage around the globe is thirty three and a third percent. It's been in the thirty-threes and thirty-fours since 1800."

To me this was a mind blowing! It represents challenges to us as a church and as youth leaders. We have so many people to tell the hope of our faith. As we enter into this new year of 2008 I want to challenge each youth director to be aggressive with evangelism. Make evangelism the key word in all your promotions. James Black has a book written on Youth Evangelism, which will be promoted in every church throughout North American Division in 2008 encouraging every youth to participate in the mission of the church through evangelism. I salute him for this urgency he is putting before his youth leaders. I want to see us be known as youth of action, youth who want to tell the world the good news about the second coming of Jesus Christ.

NORTHEAST INDIA UNION YOUTH CONVENTION AIZAWL, MIZORAM, INDIA JANUARY 17 – 20, 2008

he writer's trip this time was a long one, from Washington Dulles Airport to Frankfurt, then to Delhi, Kolkata and finally Aizawl, it took him 36 hours for the flights and the transits. When the writer reached Kolkata, he was fetched by Dr. Lionel Lyngdoh, the Southern Asia Division Youth Director. Dr. Lyngdoh himself arrived at Kolkata after 36 hours travelling by train from Hosur, India, the SUD Headquarters and they travelled together to Aizawl.

Aizawl, the capital of the State of Mizoram, India is a city where the Mizo Conference is located. This is a beautiful and amazing city built on the rocks of the mountains, the way they built those concrete buildings and the houses was so amazing, needing extraordinary engineering skills. When a former GC President visited this city he said that Aizawl should be regarded as one of the Seven Wonders of the World. The Lengpui Airport is surrounded by mountains which easily causes delays and cancellations of flights when fogs cover the runway. State of Mizoram is the only Christian area of India, and the writer needed to get a special permit to enter Aizawl. The people here are called the Mizos and they belong to the Mongoloid race who traced back their origin from Shan State of Myanmar or Burma. At Lengpui airport they were met by Pastor Zimik, Northeast

India Union Youth Director and Pastor Sanga, the Executive Secretary as well as the Youth Director of Mizo Conference.

The venue for the Youth Convention was 7th Day Tlang, Aizawl, located on a high hill owned by the Mizo Conference. The Helen Lowry auditorium had room for



1,000 people and they built a huge tent outside the auditorium for the additional of 1,000 people. On Sabbath, January 19, 2,000 people gathered together when the 7th Day Adventists from the



neighboring churches joined the 735 delegates to this convention to worship the Lord. One interesting thing which the writer experienced for the first time in his ministries was when he preached he was translated live and simultaneously by 5 (five) translators in 5 different languages without using any translation kits. All the people could hear at the same time all those 5 translations and picked up the one they understood. The theme for this convention was "It's Time." The delegates were reminded and encouraged that it's time to tell the world, to reclaim our youth, to connect with Jesus, to pray, to involve our youth, to serve, to totally commit, to wake up and to say no to temptation. This youth convention was strongly supported by the Northeast India Union Administration under the direct leadership of Dr. Colney, the Union President who attended the whole duration of this convention together with all the Local Conferences/Missions' Presidents.

Our Seventh-day Adventists in the State of Mizoram are very good singers and musicians, they provided many delightful heavenly music throughout the convention. Class presentations were given in plenary sessions as well as the class modules for 5 different languages. Sabbath afternoon program was filled with music, youth activity reports and testimonies from local conferences and missions. More power to Pastor Zimik and Dr. Lyngdoh!

Lord of the lower March 22 - 29, 2008 Youth Week of Prayer

very once in a while you meet someone who tell you that it was during a special revival week that they made their commitment to follow Jesus, 100%; and you really feel good. I heard the story of a young man who after battling with an "addiction" that would embarrass most people, found help, his way back to God, and accepted God's grace and forgiveness, all because of a special Youth Week of Prayer (YWOP) and spiritual emphasis. The special week can be the beginning of a new way of life for the young people of your church, their friends, and families.

First thing to remember, on page 4 of the 2008 WOP issue that was mailed out last year, and is still available online www. youth.gc.adventist.org or by mail, we included helpful hints on planning and conducting your Week of Prayer. Here are a few things you must do, now.

PLAN AHEAD. Start your planning, develop your target, and get your team together, make sure your pastor or church elder is a part of that team.

CHOOSE A THEME SONG. Involve your youth choir; if your church does not have a youth choir, this is the perfect time to get one started. On page 47 we have included a suggested accompaniment CD information on two songs that we think would be good theme song choices. Music can make a difference and help to set the tone to any service.

FORM A WEEK OF PRAYER DEVELOPMENT/REVIEW TEAM. Depending on the size of your church this group can be four to eight persons who will go through all

eight days' readings with you. Include on your team only interested and committed young adults, youth ministry leaders (Pathfinder, Sabbath School, etc., your pastor/s), this is important because it gives ownership to the entire group, rather than just you and your assistant. Ask the group to commit to meeting for at least five weeks—at least one week for two lessons, and an extra week to wrap things up. Be sure to identify the goal and direction to want to go, preferably at the first meeting, and choose a young person to speak for each day.

TAKE A SURVEY. Find out who your young people are. Establish a core group among the young people in your church, even if they are not attending the youth meetings. Share your plans and goals for the **Week of Prayer** with them. Start slowly, start small, but, **PLEASE** begin early.

PLAN A COMMUNION SERVICE/AGAPE FEAST. Friday's lesson, Scandalous! is about the footwashing ordinance. A communion service on Friday evening toward the end of the service would be a wonderful idea.
